Welcome to the first newsletter edition of the Nevada College Access Challenge Grant (NVCACG). As part of Chancellor Daniel Klaich's focus on strengthening educational partnerships to increase college participation and completion rates, NVCACG focuses on scaling up access programs and activities throughout the State.

NVCACG is funded by a US Department of Education grant. Dr. Magdalena Martinez, Assistant Vice Chancellor for Academic and Student Affairs for the Nevada System of Higher Education (NSHE) is the named Principal Investigator. Dr. Edith Fernández is the Director for College Access Programs and will be directing this effort with a dynamic team dedicated to building a brighter future for Nevada. Team members include Lucy Flores, Access Coordinator, and Mallory Levins, Access Assistant. Collectively, the NSHE College Access Team brings over three decades of experience in higher education and student services. The team is invested in our Nevada community and dedi-

The Challenge Grant

Nevada is one of 24 states that has committed, under a pact with Complete College America, to increase college completion rates. To achieve this goal, the Nevada System of Higher Education will focus its College Access Challenge Grant (CACG) efforts to dramatically increase the percent of new college entrants. The \$1.5 million US Department of Education grant is the driving force.

The Nevada CACG will focus its activities on four goals:

(1) Create a college-going culture in Nevada through a strategic statewide media campaign-GoToCollegeNevada.org,

(2) Increase college knowledge to encourage students to enroll and complete a quality postsecondary certificate and/or degree,

(3) Increase college participation, financial literacy and career readiness at high schools with significant numbers of low-income or high-need students; and

(4) Pilot accelerated associate degree programs that target first-time college students who are low-income and underrepresented in postsecondary completion rates at 2-year Nevada public postsecondary institutions.

Nevada Student Pledges To Go To College

Joy Wong knows how important college is for her future. That is why she went to GoToCollegeNevada.org and took an online pledge to go to college. Joy, a sophomore at Clark High School, became the first

winner (selected at random) of the pledge drive. She was awarded the laptop by Assistant Vice Chancellor Magdalena Martinez and Assemblyman-elect Jason Frierson during her morning honors class. Also present

was Principal Jill Pendleton, who encouraged other students to take Joy's lead and make the pledge.

Joy Wong commented with excitement that the new laptop would allow her to spend more time on her homework. She is going to share her experience with other students and tell them how they too can get college information and start planning their own college journey at GoToCollegeNevada.org.

Nevada CACG Supports College Access Activities

comprehensive computer based curriculum-driven program. It is designed to increase college and career readi-

ness for students through a new discipline of study and effective support elements. Navigation 101 gives each student a compass to navigate their educational career and post graduation path. Navigation 101 will teach 9th to 12th grade students about key topic areas of self-management, such as high school course selection, career planning, college education options, and financial aid, as well as self-awareness and motivation. Students receive scoped and sequenced instruction and assessment, a personalized online portfolio, integrated career center resources and

search tools, and training for student-led conferences. Education leaders at each high school receive implementation training and access to assessment tools and tracking to better advise students.

Twelve additional sub-grants were awarded to Nevada public postsecondary institutions and community based organizations to expand or initiate programs that will encourage students to enroll in college. Future newsletter editions will highlight Navigation 101 high schools and funded access programs throughout Nevada.

To implement Nevada’s CACG goals, public postsecondary institutions, public high schools, and community based organizations were eligible to apply for competitive sub-grants to expand or initiate new access activities that reach underrepresented students.

Ten Nevada public high schools were selected as sites for the implementation of Navigation 101 with College Access Challenge Grant funds. Navigation 101 is a
